The potential loss of tax revenue for the Towns, County and School districts for a small county such as Seneca County is devastating and will have to be born by the other residents of the counties and towns. The ability of the Native Americans to disregard the laws of the area and still reap the benefits of utilities, road maintenance and other supplied services all paid for by the others in the area is not fair.
